On receiving the inessage Seffer flew into a rage and said that he would kill her with two large horae pistols that he had. He still watched the house and she was afraid that he would carry out his threat. warrant was sworn to for Seffer's arrest.

When Officer James Smith served the doepment upon Seffer in his room at 405½ Gough street last night the cook became very angry and showed fight. Suffer is a powerfully built young fellow and the policeman had a sharp struggle to overpower him.
