<u>Composer Notes</u> Aeropittura (2017) by Daniel Godsil

In 2014 I attended an exhibition of Italian Futurist art at the Guggenheim Museum in New York. I was particularly inspired by the *Aeropittura*, or "aeropainting", on display. In the spirit of the Futurists' celebration of technology, these paintings used the excitement and perspectives offered by powered flight as new subject matter for their works. When composing this work, I used one of the many manifestos churned out by the Futurists as a guide, but one for poetry: the *Manifesto dell'Aeropoesia* of Futurist founder F.T. Marinetti. In it, he lists 22 qualities that a successful "aeropoem" should have, of which I used several. It should

Composer Bio

Born and raised in central Illinois, **Daniel Godsil** (b. 1982) is a composer of chamber, orchestral, vocal, electronic, and film music, currently pursuing his Ph.D. in Composition and Theory at the University of California, Davis. He holds an MFA in Music Composition from the Vermont College of Fine Arts, where he studied with John Fitz Rogers, John Mallia, and Jonathan Bailey Holland. He also holds a BM in Music Composition from Webster University.

His music, which has been described by *San Francisco Classical Voice* as having an "intense dramatic narrative", draws from such eclectic influences as rock and heavy metal, science-fiction, and Brutalist architecture.

Notable ensemble performers include Talujon Percussion, the Metropolitan Orchestra of Saint Louis, the University Symphony Orchestra at California State University, Fullerton, the Knox-Galesburg Symphony, Lineage Percussion, the Secret String Quartet, and the Nova Singers, among many others. Recent film scores include the PBS documentary *Boxcar People*, Man Ray's 1926 silent film *Emak-Bakia*, and the feature film *H.G. Welles' The First Men In The Moon*. Godsil was twice a finalist in The American Prize Composition Competition (in 2013 and 2014), and was a finalist in the 2014 Red Note New Music Festival Composition Competition. His Quintet for Woodwinds won first prize in the 2004 Fisher Young Composer's Competition. His choral works are published by Alliance Music Publishing and NoteNova Publishing.

Godsil has also been active as an educator, conductor, and performer in the central Illinois area, Knox College, Monmouth College, and Carl Sandburg College. At Knox College, he directed the New Music Ensemble, Wind Ensemble, Chamber Ensemble, and Men's Chorus. He has also held posts as choral accompanist and collaborative pianist, and served as Music Director and Organist at Grace Episcopal Church in Galesburg, IL.
