

## RAILROADS.

### The Sun Jose Road Purchased by the Central Pacific.

The great railroad corporation which constructed the route over the Sierras and through the deserts of Utah is destined to control and own all the railroads of the State. Like Aaron's serpent, it deliberately swallows the lesser snakes and seems rather to enjoy it. The final arrangements for the transfer of the San Francisco and San Jose Railroad to the Central or Western Pacific have been completed, and possession is to be given on the first day of April proximo.

#### THE CONSIDERATION

Agreed upon is \$3,251,000, of which one and one half millions, in coin, will be paid at the time of the delivery of possession. The terms upon which the balance will be paid are not made public. It is stated that a bill will be introduced in the Legislature authorizing the county of San Mateo to relinquish her \$100,000 bonds to the Central, taking stock of the Company in payment.

#### THE MARKET-STREET RAILROAD

Is included in the purchase; thus giving the through route a line of rail directly into the heart of the city. Whether or not an effort will be made to secure the privilege of running the passenger cars by steam through Market street remains to be seen.

### SERIOUS ACCIDENT.

#### Crushed Beneath a Pile of Circular Saws.

Nathan W. Spaulding, of the firm of Spaulding & Co., Pacific Saw Factory, and a member of the City Council of Oakland, has met with a serious accident. At about four o'clock yesterday afternoon a lot of large and heavy circular saws fell upon him, in the factory, producing a fracture of the right thigh and inflicting internal injuries of a most serious description. Drs. Chamberlain and McNutt are in attendance on Mr. Spaulding, but it is feared that the injuries will prove fatal.
