

GLEN PARK WANTS WIRES MADE SAFER

Overhead Trolleys Said to Be Dangerous

A petition is being prepared by the residents of the Glen Park district asking that the wiring and tracks of the United Railroads across the bridge between Sunnyside and Glen Park be kept in better order. Twice during the past week nearly fatal accidents have occurred.

Yesterday afternoon when car No. 874 was crossing the structure the trolley wire dropped, short circuiting the entire line and causing a panic among the passengers on board. A little over a week ago the wire fell without apparent cause, and killed two horses attached to a delivery wagon, nearly electrocuting the driver.

The United Railroads is placing rock on the hill at Chenery street, for the purpose of raising its tracks out of the mud.

The merchants at Chenery and Diamond streets are protesting against the condition of those streets. Mud and water to a depth of two feet have been standing there during the entire winter and a request is being prepared for presentation to the Board of Public Works in an effort to have the nuisance rectified.

At the meeting of the Glen Park Improvement Club, which will be held this evening in Diamond Hall, at the corner of Chenery and Diamond streets, standing committees will be appointed to take up the various improvement projects to be agitated by the club during the coming year. The secretary has received a notification from the Twenty-eighth and Diamond Street Improvement Club that it will cooperate in trying to secure a new street-car line along Diamond street.
